


Family Planning Waiver

Quarterly Report Requirement

The Family Planning Waiver provides family planning services to women aged 14 through 55 years, losing Florida Medicaid coverage, who have a family income at or below 191 percent of the federal poverty level, and who are not otherwise eligible for Florida Medicaid, Children's Health Insurance Program, or other health insurance coverage providing family planning services.

The State is required to submit a quarterly report summarizing the events that occurred during the quarter or anticipated to occur in the near future that affect health care delivery. This report is the third quarter report for demonstration year (DY) 19 covering the period of January 1, 2017, through March 31, 2017.

Eligibility and Enrollment


Eligibility for the Family Planning Waiver is limited to two years after losing Florida Medicaid Coverage, subject to an annual redetermination. The two populations included in the Family Planning waiver are defined as:

Population 1: Woman losing Florida Medicaid eligibility 60-days postpartum who were enrolled in Florida Medicaid under the Sixth Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (SOBRA)


Population 2: Woman losing Florida Medicaid eligibility who were not enrolled in Florida Medicaid under the SOBRA

Total enrollment in the Family Planning Waiver for 2016 has remained consistent from quarter to quarter.





Enrollment for population 1 increased from 12% to 17% of total enrollment this quarter. The total enrollment and participation rate decreased overall. The data for the participation rate figures is limited to claims paid through April 2017, for dates of service during the reporting period and therefore may be incomplete.



Program Outreach Awareness and Notification

The Florida Department of Health is responsible for conducting monitoring and outreach activities for the Family Planning Waiver.

General Outreach and Awareness

The Florida Family Health Line, a toll-free hotline, provided 2,126 callers with information about the Family Planning Waiver during this quarter.

Quality Assurance and Monitoring Activities

The Department of Health monitors the Family Planning Waiver program while conducting its performance improvement monitoring for each county health department (CHD). The performance improvement monitoring ensures that local CHDs maintain compliance with waiver requirements, and appropriate staff have received mandatory training.

The performance improvement monitoring process follows a four-year cycle:

Year 1 – Onsite monitoring visits

Year 2 – Follow-up calls

Year 3 – Desk review

Year 4 – Technical assistance call

The Department of Health conducted the following monitoring activities during this quarter:

- Three CHDs received an onsite visit
- One CHDs received a follow-up call
- Three CHDs received a desk review
- Three CHDs received a technical assistance call


Evaluation Activities
