- **SUBJECT:** Further extension of the Spousal Impoverishment Rules for Married Applicants and Recipients of Home and Community-Based Services

The purpose of this CMCS Informational Bulletin is to advise you that the "Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023" (P.L. 117-328, enacted on December 29, 2022) modifies section 2404 of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) to require that state Medicaid agencies apply the spousal impoverishment rules to married applicants and beneficiaries eligible for home and community-based services (HCBS) through September 30, 2027.¹

The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 provides a temporary extension of the ACA's spousal impoverishment-related provision, which initially was set to expire on December 31, 2018, but has been extended several times through subsequent legislation.² CMS has informed states of prior extensions through CMCS Informational Bulletins.³ As CMS has noted with regard to previous extensions, states should continue to follow the guidance CMS published in SMDL #15-001 ("Affordable Care Act's Amendments to the Spousal Impoverishment Statute," *available at* https://www.medicaid.gov/federal-policy-guidance/downloads/smd050715.pdf) relating to the application of the ACA's spousal impoverishment-related provision so long as section 2404 of the ACA is in effect.
