The Secretary of Health is requesting an amendment to Maryland's §1115 HealthChoice demonstration to continue the Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) authority granted during the Public Health Emergency (PHE). Pursuant to Chapter 282 of the Acts of 2023 (SB26), the Department must establish an ELE program for redeterminations of individuals with Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Medicaid.

Additionally, Maryland is requesting the continuation of the waiver of the Four Walls Requirement to allow clinics to bill telehealth services at the standard rates. This waiver was granted during the PHE, and is strongly supported by the state's provider community.

The Department looks forward to working with CMS to continue these authorizations, which will increase access to care and services. 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Maryland Section §1115 Waiver Amendment Submission

Amendment Introduction and Objectives

The Maryland Department of Health (MDH) is pleased to submit this §1115 waiver amendment application for the HealthChoice program. HealthChoice, Maryland's statewide mandatory Medicaid managed care program, was implemented in July 1997 under authority of a waiver through §1115 of the Social Security Act. The initial waiver was approved for five years. In January 2002, MDH completed the first comprehensive evaluation of HealthChoice as part of the first §1115 waiver renewal. The 2002 evaluation examined HealthChoice performance by comparing service use during the program's initial years with utilization during State Fiscal Year (SFY) 1997, the final year without managed care. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved subsequent waiver renewals in 2005, 2007, 2010, 2013, 2016 and 2021.

This amendment would authorize MDH to establish, on a permanent basis, Express Lane Eligibility for certain adults who qualify for Medicaid based on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) verified income. Additionally, it would adopt on a permanent basis the temporary §1135 waiver granted during the national public health emergency, regarding the Four Walls Requirement for clinics.

Introduction

Express Lane Eligibility

The Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (CHIPRA) authorized states to establish express lane eligibility (ELE) to efficiently enroll eligible children in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). ELE permits states to rely on findings, such as income, household size, or other factors of eligibility from another program designated as an express lane agency (ELA) to facilitate enrollment in health coverage. ELAs may include SNAP, School Lunch, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Head Start, National School Lunch Program (NSLP), and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), among others. A state may also use information from state income tax data to identify children in families that might qualify, so that families do not have to submit income information.

During unwinding of the continuous eligibility provisions of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), Maryland received approval under §1902(e)(14)(A) of the Social Security Act to temporarily renew Medicaid eligibility for individuals who are also receiving benefits under SNAP, including both children and adults. Under this authority, the State renews Medicaid eligibility for SNAP participants using gross income as determined by SNAP without conducting a separate income determination. This temporary authority will remain in effect until April 30, 2024.

In 2023, the Maryland General Assembly passed Senate Bill 26 – Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Workgroup on Low-Income Utility Assistance – (Chapter 282), which required MDH to establish an ELE program for redeterminations of individuals with SNAP benefits in Medicaid and the Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP), effective January 1, 2025. The legislation requires MDH to designate SNAP as the ELA to support the program and facilitate Medicaid/MCHP eligibility redetermination.

As authorized by CHIPRA, MDH will submit a State Plan Amendment to make ELE for redeterminations of eligible children permanent. This §1115 waiver amendment is being requested to cover eligible adults for redeterminations.

Four Walls Requirement Waiver

Clinics must adhere to federal Medicaid regulations governing clinics (42 C.F.R. §440.90 - Clinic Services). Absent a waiver, Medicaid may not reimburse clinics if neither the practitioner nor patient is physically located within the clinic. This requirement applies to all freestanding clinics participating in the Maryland Medicaid program, including community-based clinics or School Based Health Clinics (SBHCs).

On August 31, 2020, CMS approved additional flexibilities to Maryland's waiver under §1135 of the Social Security Act to address challenges posed by COVID-19. CMS granted Maryland a temporary waiver of the rule requiring that either the practitioner or patient be physically located within the clinic when billing Maryland Medicaid for services. The waiver permits services provided via telehealth from clinic practitioners' homes (or another location) to be considered to provide at the clinic for purposes of 42 C.F.R. §440.90(a). Under this authority, all clinics may receive Medicaid reimbursement for services rendered if both the practitioner and the patient are in their homes for the duration of the federal government's declared public health emergency.

This §1115 waiver amendment is requesting to continue this waiver of the Four Walls Requirement and allow clinics to bill telehealth services at the standard rates.

Requested Policy Changes, Objectives, and Rationale

Express Lane Eligibility

MDH requests an amendment to the current §1115 waiver for ELE redeterminations of adults with SNAP benefits. The rationale for the request is to obtain authority for renewal purposes effective May 1, 2024, so that the State has no gap in renewal functionality after the §1902(e)(14)(A) authority expires. In addition, the amendment, in tandem with the State Plan Amendment to authorize ELE redeterminations for children, will bring Maryland Medicaid into compliance with SB 26.

Under the ELE process, eligible adults who are receiving SNAP benefits and meet Medicaid income thresholds may be automatically renewed in Medicaid, contingent on meeting other Medicaid eligibility criteria as defined by MDH. The process applies to the following population, which is a continuation of current §1902(e)(14)(A) waiver authority:

a) Adults aged 19 to 64 whose SNAP verified income is at or below 138 percent FPL

Four Walls Requirement

MDH requests an amendment to the current §1115 waiver to continue the suspension of the Four Walls Requirement which requires clinics to provide services within the four walls except for homeless populations per 42 C.F.R. §440.90. MDH requests to allow for delivery of services to participants located in the home or other secure setting by clinicians also located off-site. This would continue allowing clinics to provide telehealth services and be reimbursed at the standard rate. The rationale for this request is to maintain continuity of operations and reimbursement for all clinics.

Anticipated Outcomes

Express Lane Eligibility

This amendment will facilitate streamlined and efficient Medicaid renewals, by allowing qualifying adult participants to maintain Medicaid coverage more easily without disruption, improving their health care access, and ultimately their health.

Four Walls Requirement

This amendment will enable continued operations and reimbursements for clinics, which will allow for continued access to care for participants receiving services.

Evaluation Design

Maryland's 1115 Waiver Evaluation design will be modified to incorporate the Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) and Four Walls Requirement Waiver demonstration proposal. The table below outlines the proposed hypotheses for this 1115 Waiver amendment and potential performance measures that would allow HeathChoice to effectively test each of the specific hypotheses.

Budget Neutrality

Express Lane Eligibility

Maryland expects additional adults to remain covered in Medicaid because of ELE. Without a waiver, Medicaid expects that some individuals may churn off and back on to Medicaid coverage. Due to the maintenance of effort requirements enacted in the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency, this waiver will not result in additional costs. In addition, Maryland received §1902(e)(14)(A) authority to utilize SNAP eligibility during the FFCRA unwinding period; this waiver amendment will serve to transition ELE to an authority that is not time-bound by the unwinding period.

Four Walls Requirement

As Maryland Medicaid is currently reimbursing for services provided without the provider and/or patient being physically located in the clinic, this amendment would not require additional funds and thus will be budget neutral. Maryland Medicaid would continue to reimburse providers in this situation absent the Public Health Emergency flexibility under section §1135 of the Social Security Act. In addition, these services would be reimbursed absent the waiver so long as the provider and/or patient was physically located in the clinic.

Public Process and Indian Consultation Requirements

MDH provided public notice and solicited stakeholder participation for this §1115 waiver amendment application per the requirements in 42 C.F.R. §431.408. Notice was published in the Maryland Register on August 25, 2023 and September 8, 2023, as well as on MDH's website on August 25, 2023 (See Appendix B: List of Attachments). MDH provided a 30-day public comment period, from September 1, 2023 through October 2, 2023.

In addition to publishing these notices, MDH conducted two virtual public hearings on the amendment application. The first hearing was held on September 12, 2023. The second hearing was held on September 27, 2023 during the Maryland Medicaid Advisory Committee (MMAC) meeting, to facilitate attendance by MMAC members and stakeholders attending this public forum. Both hearings were accessible by audio conference and presented as a webinar so that slides would also be visible to participants. Agendas and slides from both hearings were shared with registrants prior to the meeting and were later posted to the MDH website linked below.

During these hearings, MDH presented a summary of the amendment draft and accepted verbal and written comments from stakeholders (see Appendix A: Summary of Public Comments and Maryland §1115 Waiver Amendment Attachments for additional information on comments received). The public was also able to access information about the waiver amendment and submission of comments on MDH's website via the link:

Additionally, on September 1, 2023, MDH sent an overview of the §1115 amendment application to Ms. Jessica Dickerson, Medical Case Manager of Native American Lifelines of Baltimore and appointed Committee Member on the MMAC, for input and comments. Ms. Dickerson acknowledged that she reviewed the amendment and did not have comments (See Appendix A: Summary of Public Comments and Maryland Section §1115 Waiver Amendment Attachments).

Beyond these requirements, MDH continually consults with stakeholders on the HealthChoice program through the MMAC. The MMAC meets monthly and receives reports on regulatory and waiver changes, including amendments to the §1115 HealthChoice waiver. Annually, the MMAC provides feedback on the HealthChoice evaluation report. Notice of the waiver amendment, and public hearings, was distributed to the MMAC stakeholder email list, with instruction to submit written comments to MDH's stakeholder email address, MDH.healthchoicerenewal@maryland.gov.

Appendix A: Summary of Public Comments

MDH received a total of 17 verbal and written comments, from 12 separate organizations. The comments expressed support for Express Lane Eligibility and the extension of the Four Walls Requirement suspension. A summary of the comments received follows.

Ten stakeholders wrote to offer their support for the Four Wall Requirements waiver and six stakeholders expressed support for Express Lane Eligibility. Many noted that the continued suspension of the Four-Walls Requirement would remove limitations to reimbursement for telehealth services; several comments described how the waiver would support the delivery of care at school-based health centers and increase access to behavioral health services and supports. Multiple comments expressed their support for MDH to continue using SNAP eligibility to redetermine Medicaid and CHIP enrollees' eligibility to maintain their coverage and reduce the administrative burden for enrollees. One respondent urged the State to apply for additional waivers to further expand the Maryland Easy Enrollment Health Insurance Program using information from their state tax returns to enroll eligible Marylanders into Medicaid. MDH received three verbal questions during its public hearings. Two requested additional information about the waiver of the Four Walls Requirement regarding which types of clinics are impacted by the requirement. The third question requested clarification about the contents of the amendment.

The Cumulative Table of COMAR Regulations Adopted, Amended or Repealed, found online, also identifies each regulation incorporating a document. Documents incorporated by reference are available for inspection in various depository libraries located throughout the State and at the Division of State Documents. - By petitioning an agency to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations. The agency must respond to the petition. (See SG §10-123)
- By petitioning an agency to issue a declaratory ruling with respect to how any regulation, order, or statute enforced by the agency applies. (SG, Title 10, Subtitle 3)
- By petitioning the circuit court for a declaratory judgment on the validity of a regulation when it appears that the regulation interferes with or impairs the legal rights or privileges of the petitioner. (SG, §10-125)
- By inspecting a certified copy of any document filed with the Division of State Documents for publication in the Maryland Register. (See SG, §7-213)

HealthChoice, first implemented in 1997 under the authority of Section 1115 of the Social Security Act, is Maryland's statewide mandatory managed care program for Medicaid enrollees. Under HealthChoice, eligible families and individuals are required to enroll in a managed care organization that has been approved by the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. Each managed care organization is responsible for ensuring that HealthChoice enrollees have access to a network of medical providers that can meet the health needs of each enrollee.

The 2021 renewal; made the following changes to the demonstration:

- Created the MOM Model pilot initiative to reduce the burden of neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS) and its associated costs, and improve maternal health outcomes, by providing case management along with somatic and behavioral care to pregnant people diagnosed with an opioid use disorder (OUD);
- Created a voluntary, five-year payment model in Annapolis, Baltimore City, and Montgomery counties, that provides greater flexibility to ambulance care teams to address emergency health care needs following a 911 call by allowing for payment for ground transports to alternative destinations such as urgent care providers in addition to the ED;
- Created an expenditure authority to cover Medicaid adults aged 21 to 64 that have an SMI diagnosis who are residing in a private IMD;
- Modified Maryland's coverage of ASAM Level 4.0 to include not only providers located in Maryland, but also those based in contiguous states;
- Raised the participant spaces for the Assistance in Community Integration Services (ACIS) Pilot from 600 to 900; and
- Expanded the allowable time-frame of eligibility in the Healthy Families America (HFA) evidence-based Home Visiting Services (HVS) Pilot from age two to age three.

- Raised the enrollment cap for the Increased Community Services program from 30 to 100; and
- Expanded dental benefits for former foster youth.

I work with the Maryland Medicaid Office of Innovation, Research, and Development and wanted to share that the Maryland Department of Health (the Department) is proposing an amendment application to its HealthChoice §1115 demonstration waiver.

This past legislative session required the Department to adopt an Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program to help streamline eligibility redeterminations for Medicaid and Maryland Children's Health Program for children and certain adults with SNAP benefits. As authorized by the Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (CHIPRA), the Department will submit a State Plan Amendment to adopt ELE for redeterminations of eligible children permanently. This section §1115 waiver amendment is being requested to cover eligible adults for redeterminations. Additionally, the Department is requesting to continue its flexibilities granted under the State's 1135 waiver of the Four Walls Requirement to allow clinics to be reimbursed for rendered telehealth services.

The State's public comment period begins today, September 1, 2023 and ends October 2, 2023. I attached a copy of the proposal in case it's helpful, but it can also be found on our [1115 Waiver Renewal Website](#).

HealthChoice Overview

History of HealthChoice

- HealthChoice, first implemented in 1997 under the authority of §1115 of the Social Security Act, is Maryland's statewide mandatory managed care program for Medicaid enrollees.
- The HealthChoice §1115 Demonstration Waiver was last renewed in 2021; the current waiver term extends for five years (calendar years 2022-2026).
- The HealthChoice program is a mature demonstration that has been proven to increase access to quality health care and reduce overall health care spending.

History of HealthChoice

- In December 2021, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved Maryland's application for a seventh extension of the HealthChoice demonstration.
- MDH submitted a previous waiver amendment application in June 2022, to phase out the Adult Dental Pilot and Alternative Destination Pilot, due to legislative changes.
- The current waiver amendment application will be submitted to CMS in November for approval by and implementation on May 1, 2024.

COVID-19 Impact

- Could not disenroll members from Medicaid as a result of the Public Health Emergency, creating a significant impact on eligibility numbers compared to last year.
- Expansion of services delivered via telehealth, including audio-only telehealth visits.
- Waived enforcement of monthly premium payments for the Maryland Children's Health Program Premium and Employed Individuals with Disabilities, and introduced other flexibilities surrounding the delivery of long-term services and supports.
- Relaxed provider enrollment and registration requirements and collaborated with the MCOs to establish a global risk corridor as a fiscal safeguard.

Current Enrollment

As of September 2023...

- There were 1,531,407 individuals enrolled in HealthChoice, representing 86 percent of total Maryland Medicaid enrollment.
- 463,282 adults were enrolled through the ACA Medicaid expansion.

Express Lane Eligibility (ELE)

- The Children’s Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (CHIPRA) authorized states to establish ELE to efficiently enroll or renew eligible children in Medicaid and the Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP).
- During unwinding of the continuous eligibility provisions of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), Maryland received CMS approval to temporarily renew Medicaid eligibility for individuals who are also receiving benefits under SNAP, including both children and adults.
- This temporary authority will remain in effect until April 30, 2024.

§1115 Waiver Amendment Initiatives

Express Lane Eligibility (ELE)

- (SB) 26 – *Maryland Medical Assistance Program, Maryland Children's Health Program, and Workgroup on Low-Income Utility Assistance* – (Chapter 282), requires Maryland Medicaid to establish an ELE program for redeterminations of individuals with SNAP benefits in Medicaid and the Maryland Children's Health Program (MCHP), effective January 1, 2025.
- This §1115 Waiver amendment is requesting authority to adopt ELE redeterminations of adults with SNAP benefits, effective May 1, 2024.
 - Adults aged 19 to 64 whose SNAP verified income is at or below 138% FPL
- Additionally, Medicaid will submit a State Plan Amendment to authorize ELE redeterminations for children.

§1115 Waiver Amendment Initiatives

Four Walls Requirement

- On August 31, 2020, CMS approved additional flexibilities to Maryland's waiver under section 1135 which granted a temporary waiver of 42 C.F.R. § 440.90 requiring that either the practitioner or patient be physically located within the clinic when billing Maryland Medicaid for services.
- The section 1135 waiver permits services provided via telehealth from clinic practitioners' homes (or another location) to be considered to be provided at the clinic for purposes of 42 C.F.R. § 440.90(a).
- This section 1115 Waiver amendment is requesting to continue the State's section 1135 waiver of the Four Walls Requirement to allow clinics to bill telehealth services at the standard rates.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the Maryland Section §1115 Waiver Amendment Application, and for your leadership in pursuing access to quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders. We at Maryland Citizens' Health Initiative would like to express our strong support. The Maryland Health Care for All! Coalition is made up of hundreds of faith, business, community, health care, and consumer organizations from across the state all working toward achieving quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders. The coalition strongly supports automatically enrolling all Marylanders eligible for free or very low-cost health care plans in health care coverage.

We would like to thank lead sponsors Delegate Lorig Charkoudian and Senator Malcolm Augustine, the Maryland General Assembly, and Governor Moore for passing legislation to allow SNAP recipients to automatically renew and enroll in Medicaid coverage.

Under temporary authority from CMS so far 35,000 Marylanders enrolled in SNAP have been able to retain their Medicaid coverage automatically during the Medicaid unwinding process, thus keeping their access to life-saving medical care. We thank you and the Department of Health for this incredible achievement. This waiver application is a critical step to ensuring that this successful program continue.

We also support the continued waiver of the Four Walls Requirement. Many Marylanders, especially vulnerable and underserved populations, rely on telehealth to continue to receive care. Continuing Medicaid enrollees ability to access telehealth is a matter of health equity.

In the future we looking forward to supporting an additional waiver application to newly enroll SNAP recipients into Medicaid. Based on [Census Bureau data for 2021](#), 65,000 uninsured state residents receive SNAP—nearly one in five uninsured Marylanders (17%). Newly enrolling SNAP recipients into Medicaid will dramatically reduce the number of uninsured in Maryland. A federal waiver would ensure that minor technical differences between SNAP and Medicaid income definitions do not prevent the implementation of this program.

We also urge the Department of Health to apply for two waivers that would allow Maryland to fully implement the Easy Enrollment Health Insurance Program and automatically enroll eligible Marylanders into Medicaid based on information from their state tax returns. Waivers will be needed

to ensure that 1) Marylanders who are verified to be U.S. citizens by records maintained by the Social Security Administration and other agencies do not additionally have to attest to their citizenship and 2) Maryland can base financial eligibility on prior-year income shown on the tax form rather than requiring Marylanders to fill out forms attesting to current income levels. These two waivers are critical to ensure that Maryland can enroll as many uninsured eligible tax filers into Medicaid as possible without them getting stuck in the enrolment gap.

Thank you for your leadership and consideration of these comments to help ensure access to quality, affordable health care for all Marylanders.

Thanks again for your questions on MDH's 1115 waiver amendment. See our response in red below.

To clarify, is this just for renewal of Medicaid, or also for enrollment? Are we already renewing adults into Medicaid who are enrolled in SNAP during the Medicaid unwinding?

Pursuant to SB 26, the Department is implementing express lane eligibility for renewals before initial enrollment. To your second question, during unwinding of the continuous eligibility provisions of FFCRA, Maryland received approval under Section 1902(e)(14)(A) of the Social Security Act to temporarily renew Medicaid eligibility for individuals who are also receiving benefits under SNAP. Under this authority, the State will renew Medicaid eligibility for SNAP participants using gross income as determined by SNAP without conducting a separate income determination. This temporary authority will remain in effect until April 30, 2024. The amendment we are applying for is a continuation of this temporary authority, so that we have no gap in functionality after the (e)(14) authority expires.

And is the amendment for all adults enrolled in SNAP? Or only adults in households with children who are enrolled in SNAP?

The amendment is for adults between age 19 to 64 and enrolled in Medicaid, whose SNAP verified income is at or below 138% FPL.

We look forward to continuing our collaboration on these efforts.

MACHC applauds the Department's commitment to facilitate Medicaid and/or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) enrollment renewal for qualified Marylanders through the 1115 Waiver Amendment to implement Express Lane Eligibility for all members up to age 65 of an eligible Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) household. With the challenges the State faces with redeterminations as well as the challenges faced by many Medicaid and CHIP enrollees to maintain their coverage, implementation of express lane eligibility for adult members of families receiving SNAP benefits will greatly enhance the State's ability to maximize renewal of Medicaid and CHIP enrollees.

MACHC also strongly supports the State's 1115 Waiver Amendment to make permanent the temporary 1135 waiver granted during the national public health emergency regarding the "Four Walls Requirement" for clinics that enabled MACHC members to provide telehealth services to patients of their clinics without the requirement that either the provider or the patient be within the four walls of the clinic. MACHC's members have found unequivocally that the telehealth flexibility this waiver would retain has dramatically enhanced access to care for Maryland's most vulnerable populations that would otherwise have been unable to access necessary healthcare services. As a result of the flexibility provided, FQHCs and other community health centers and clinics can better meet behavioral health needs, post-hospitalization visits that improve continuity of care, urgent health care needs that might otherwise cause more costly care, and numerous other services that have proven to enhance health outcomes and reduce health care costs. Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on the Proposed 1115 Waiver Amendment to extend telehealth flexibilities beyond the end of the public health emergency for family planning and other types of clinics. The Maryland Affiliate of the American College of Nurse Midwives (ACNM) supports the Department's request to lift the rule the four-wall rule. The rule, by requiring either the provider or patient be within the four-walls of a clinic, reflects an outdated model of care.

We still have tremendous gaps in care, and we should be employing every strategy to meet the needs of patients. If the four-wall rule were suspended, clinics would have greater flexibility in extending their hours, deploying providers located in another state, and providing continuity of care while providers and/or patients are traveling.

The Department's request to suspend the four-walls rule will also align Maryland Medicaid's policies with broader federal priorities on family planning. In 2022, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) released \$16.3 million to expand the telehealth capacity of Title X clinics.

The Community Behavioral Health Association of Maryland (CBH) is the leading voice for community-based providers serving the mental health and addiction needs of vulnerable Marylanders. Our 89 member organizations serve the majority of those accessing care through the public behavioral health system. CBH members provide outpatient and residential treatment for mental health and addiction-related disorders, day programs, case management, Assertive Community Treatment (ACT), employment supports, and crisis intervention.

CBH strongly supports the Maryland Department of Health's (MDH) request for 1115 waiver authority to adopt on a permanent basis the temporary 1135 waiver granted during the national public health emergency, regarding the Four Walls Requirement for clinics authorized under C.F.R. § 440.90.

During the pandemic, the use of telehealth was one of the only ways to ensure that adults and children with serious behavioral health disorders continued to receive their needed treatment and support services. The inclusion of audio-only telehealth provided a way to reach those in rural communities lacking adequate broadband connectivity and those who lacked the financial resources to connect via audio-visual means.

Now that the public health emergency (PHE) has ended, we find that telehealth – both audio-visual and audio-only - continues to be a preferred modality to receive treatment and support services for those who face challenges – such as transportation, child care, and inflexible work schedules – in accessing in-person services. The data we have collected from our members indicates that services rendered through telehealth are at least as efficacious as those rendered in-person. And while we believe that in-person services should always be available for those who prefer it or when it is clinically indicated, having the ability to continue to provide services through telehealth not only helps those we serve, but also

helps our member organizations meet rising demand while faced with severe workforce challenges.

Redetermination data from the Maryland Department of Health cite that, during August 2023, 10,339 enrollees were auto renewed and had their Medicaid coverage extended due to active enrollment in SNAP. Amidst national concerns that many individuals are inappropriately losing coverage due to procedural disenrollments, making Express Lane Eligibility permanent will significantly aid in ensuring that eligible Marylanders remain covered. Based on a report from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General evaluating the impact of Express Lane Eligibility in multiple states, many states cited reduced administrative burden, cost savings, and increased enrollment and retention.¹

This strategy will eliminate the duplication of administrative effort and will protect individuals from having to provide the same information to multiple agencies.

On behalf of Johns Hopkins Medicine (JHM), I appreciate the opportunity to provide comments supporting the draft Maryland HealthChoice Program §1115 Waiver Renewal Application. JHM serves thousands of Medicaid recipients throughout Maryland and remains deeply committed to ensuring these patients have access to high-quality care. The Maryland Department of Health (MDH) should be applauded for its work on this application, as the programs outlined in the application do an excellent job of achieving MDH's defined goals.

JHM supports both programs in this application and would like to highlight the importance of the waiver for the CMS "Four Walls Requirement." The flexibilities regarding location granted under this waiver are essential for continuing the robust telehealth access that currently exists in the State of Maryland.

Over the last three years, since the start of the pandemic, our providers have conducted almost 2 million telehealth visits, and this modality of care represents approximately 13% of current ambulatory care volume at JHM. During this time frame, telemedicine visits were more common among patients from historically marginalized groups (telemedicine accounted for 14% of visits with patients self-identifying as Black/African American vs 13% of visits with patients self-identifying as White, 15% of visits with patient enrolled in Medicaid vs 13% of visits with privately insured patients). Around half of providers offer some amount of telehealth access to patients for a majority of our specialties including psychiatry, primary care, oncology, neurology, and genetics. In our experience, most patients are seeking telehealth services from new or established regional providers with whom they also seek in person visits when clinically indicated. In practice, we have found that patients benefit from the ability to receive telehealth services in a variety of settings (at home, from the parking lot of a school or library, in a work office, etc.). We find that providers benefit from location flexibility as well. A majority of our providers choose either their own homes or a work office as a location to deliver telehealth service ([Hasselfeld et al 2023](#)).

If the waiver does not continue, we will need to require that either the provider or the patient be in the facility at the time the telehealth services is delivered. This challenge would be operationally burdensome and sometimes infeasible (some specialties have given up in person clinical space) and will thus limit the availability of telehealth visits to patients.

We are, therefore, encouraged that through this extension request, Maryland Medicaid recognizes that patients and providers benefit from telehealth location flexibility.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Maryland Department of Health (MDH)'s section 1115 waiver amendment application for the HealthChoice program. The Legal Action Center (LAC) is a non-profit law and policy organization that fights discrimination, builds health equity, and restores opportunities for individuals with substance use disorders, arrest and conviction records, and HIV/AIDS. LAC convenes the Maryland Parity Coalition and works throughout the state to improve access to substance use disorder and mental health treatment and reduce barriers to care in public and private insurance.

LAC supports MDH's amendment requests to (1) adopt on a permanent basis the temporary 1135 waiver of the Four Walls Requirement and allow clinics to bill telehealth services at the standard rates and (2) establish express lane eligibility for certain adults who qualify for Medicaid based on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance program (SNAP) verified income.

Telehealth is an important tool to help Marylanders access the mental health and substance use disorder treatment they need. Maryland has been hit especially hard by the opioid epidemic, with drug overdose death rates increasing from 11.7 per 100,000 in 2011 to 42.8 per 100,000 in 2021.¹ There is a growing disparity in overdose-related deaths in the Black community, with a rise in overdose deaths among non-Hispanic Black Marylanders by 64.5% between 2016 to 2020, compared to 15.3% among non-Hispanic white Marylanders.² Rates of mental illness and substance use disorders are most prevalent among nonelderly adults with Medicaid.³ While close to 20% of the State is in a mental health care health

professional shortage area, the recent shift toward telemedicine for mental health services is helping to bridge the gap for many Marylanders who may otherwise not be able to access the mental health and substance use disorder treatment they need.⁴

The Maryland General Assembly has extended telehealth coverage in Medicaid at parity for the next two years (SB 534), and this waiver of the Four Walls Requirement is necessary to truly effectuate that legislation. We also wish to note that Maryland law requires the State Medicaid program to reimburse for health care services that can be appropriately provided through telehealth, including treatment for substance use disorders and mental health conditions, and the State must issue regulations to limit any access to telehealth. § 15-141.2(b), (c), (h). As MDH and the Behavioral Health Administration continue to consider which services may be appropriately provided via telehealth, they must comply with appropriate administrative procedures and further ensure that any changes or limitations comply with the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act.

While many beneficiaries will continue to choose in person services, it is vital that the State continue to make telehealth as accessible as possible to ensure continuity of care. The permanent extension of the waiver of the Four Walls Requirement will help more Marylanders continue to access substance use disorder and mental health care in the way that best meets their needs. Similarly, removing unnecessary barriers to Medicaid enrollment, especially during this period of unwinding, will alleviate financial obstacles to treatment.

RE: Proposed Amendment to Maryland's 1115 Waiver Regarding the Four-Wall Rule

The Maryland Assembly on School-Based Health Care strongly supports the Department of Health's request to CMS to lift the four-walls rule through an amendment to the State's 1115 Waiver. Under the four-wall rule, Medicaid can only reimburse a clinic for telehealth services if either the provider or patient is within the "four-walls" of the facility. This restriction does not reflect the delivery care models of today.

At the core, we do not believe students should have to be within the four-walls of a school-based health center to receive services. Such a policy is detrimental to the student's health, as providers will not be able to serve students when they out of school because they are sick or for family reasons.

Providers may not be within the four-walls of a school-based health center for a number of reasons. They could be temporarily be working from home because they are sick or isolating because of COVID exposure. There are also several models of care where providers may permanently work at another location. These models include hub-and-spoke and all-telehealth models. The School-Based Health Alliance recently highlighted these innovative models in the "School-Based Telehealth Playbook" as part of the Youth Safety Net Model.ⁱ

Thank you for the Department's commitment to continuing to advance telehealth models of care by requesting CMS to suspend the four-walls rule in Maryland. If we can provide any more information that is helpful, please contact me at relliott@policypartners.net.

Maryland Community Health System (MCHS) strongly supports the Department of Health's request to CMS for a permanent suspension of the four-walls rule. The rule restricts Medicaid reimbursement for telehealth service. For certain types of clinics, the telehealth service must be delivered while either the provider or the patient is within the four-walls of the facility.

The four-wall rule does not apply to telehealth services provided by federally qualified health centers. However, MCHS is still deeply concerned about the impact of the rule on underserved communities. The rule severely limits the ability of community health centers to work with providers outside their areas. For example, a school-based health center may not be able to utilize a child psychiatrist from another region, as the provider would never be within its four-walls.

On behalf of the Maryland Hospital Association's (MHA) 60 member hospitals and health systems, we appreciate the opportunity to comment on Maryland Medicaid's § 1115 Waiver Amendment Application. MHA supported Senate Bill (SB) 26, which established the Express Lane Eligibility (ELE) program, and provided principal support for passage of the Preserve Telehealth Access Acts of 2021 and 2023. Both provisions of the waiver amendments align with MHA's priority to increase access to health care for all Marylanders, especially among vulnerable populations and communities with barriers to in-person care.

MHA led multiple legislative and policy initiatives to expand coverage for telehealth in Maryland, regardless of payer. We recognize Medicaid must adhere to federal regulations governing clinics, including provider and/or patient location, and we commend Medicaid for submitting this amendment to align with the Preserve Telehealth Access Act of 2021's statutory requirements removing originating and distant site requirements. This exception will boost patient access to services they otherwise may not have been able to obtain and allow providers flexibility, which is a critical tool to combat provider burnout and workforce shortages.

Although we recognize the state's limited role in Medicare policies, we would like to highlight one continued disparity that remains: providers for Medicare patients will continue to be bound by geographic restrictions if Congress does not make federal telehealth flexibilities permanent. We would appreciate the state's assistance to ensure all payer policies are aligned on telehealth to maximize patient care and minimize administrative burdens on providers.
