The state will be eligible to receive FFP for Rhode Island Medicaid recipients who are short-term residents in IMDs under the terms of this demonstration for coverage of medical assistance, including OUD/SUD benefits that would otherwise be matchable if the beneficiary were not residing in an IMD.</p> <p>Rhode Island must aim for a statewide average length of stay of 30 days in residential treatment settings, to be monitored pursuant to the SUD Monitoring Plan as outlined below, to ensure short-term residential treatment stays. Under this demonstration, beneficiaries will have access to high quality, evidence-based OUD and other SUD treatment services ranging from medically supervised withdrawal management to on-going chronic care for these conditions in cost-effective settings while also improving care coordination and care for comorbid physical and mental health conditions.</p> <p>The coverage of OUD/SUD treatment services and withdrawal management during short term residential and inpatient stays in IMDs will expand Rhode Island’s current SUD benefit package available to all Rhode Island Medicaid recipients, including peer support services authorized under 1115 demonstration authority as described in STC 99. Room and board costs are not considered allowable costs for residential treatment service providers unless they qualify as inpatient facilities under section 1905(a) of the Act.</p>
