Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Service (CMS)

CMS is the federal agency that provides health coverage to more than 160 million people through Medicare, Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program, and the Health Insurance Marketplace. CMS works in partnership with the entire health care community to improve quality, access to care and outcomes in the health care system.

Office of Rural Health Transformation

Within CMS, the Office of Rural Health Transformation's mission is to lead the national charge in transforming rural healthcare, leveraging American innovation and sustainable payment models to build resilient infrastructure and ensure unwavering access to high-quality care for every citizen in rural America, helping to Make America Healthy Again.

The Office of Rural Health Transformation provides for oversight, technical assistance and support for State recipients of the Rural Health Transformation (RHT) Program. Through innovative system-wide change, the RHT Program invests in the rural healthcare delivery ecosystem for future generations. Health Resources and Services Administration

The [Health Resources and Services Administration](#) (HRSA) programs provide health care to people who are geographically isolated and economically or medically vulnerable. This includes programs that deliver health services to people with HIV, pregnant women, mothers and their families, those with low incomes, residents of rural areas, American Indians and Alaska Natives, and those otherwise unable to access high-quality health care. HRSA programs also support health infrastructure, including



through training of health professionals and distributing them to areas where they are needed most, providing financial support to health care providers, and advancing telehealth. In addition, HRSA oversees programs for providing discounts on prescription drugs to safety net providers, facilitating organ, bone marrow, and cord blood transplantation, compensating individuals injured by vaccination, and maintaining data on health care malpractice payments.

The sections within this guide include information about the relevant State or community level funding that could complement RHT Program activities. The [HRSA Data Warehouse Fact Sheets](#) highlight the funded programs within each State.

Federal Office Rural Health Policy

Within HRSA, the [Federal Office of Rural Health Policy](#) (FORHP) is charged with advising the HHS Secretary on how rural health care is affected by current policies as well as proposed statutory, regulatory, administrative, and budgetary changes in the Medicare, Medicaid and other key HHS programs.

FORHP works to strengthen health care delivery systems in rural communities by supporting access to high-quality, coordinated care for the approximately 61 million Americans who live in rural areas. Through grant funding, technical assistance, research, and policy analysis, FORHP helps rural providers, hospitals, and community-based organizations improve health outcomes and address the unique challenges facing rural populations. The office also collaborates with federal partners, States, and national organizations to advance innovative solutions that enhance access to care and improve health outcomes.

One component of FORHP's work is funding the [State Offices of Rural Health \(SORH\) Program](#). The SORH serves as primary focal point for rural health within each State, sharing information and resources with rural providers and serving as a voice for rural communities at the State level. Many SORHs are actively engaged and in some cases leading RHT Program efforts. If the RHT Program leads haven't yet connected in with the SORH in their State, they are a great resource for sharing information about rural health issues and connecting rural health providers within the State. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

CDC is the nation's leading science-based, data-driven, service organization that protects the public's health. CDC works 24/7 to protect America from health, safety and security threats, both foreign and in the U.S.

CDC Office of Rural Health

[CDC's Office of Rural Health \(ORH\)](#) advances the best available rural public health science and evidence-based practices through a coordinated, transparent, and strategic approach across CDC and in partnership with rural-serving organizations and public health systems. The Office developed and leads implementation of [CDC's Rural Public Health Strategic Plan](#), which guides the agency's rural-focused programs and research. The plan outlines key priorities and objectives for improving the public health system in rural areas and outcomes that illustrate what CDC hopes to achieve.

Rural Health Safety Net

While there are other types of facilities in rural areas, these are some key federally designated health care provider types that make up a key part of the rural safety net. There are links to show where the sites are located.

The [State Offices of Rural Health](#) are great connectors to the Rural Health Clinics, Critical Access Hospitals, and Rural Emergency Hospitals within a State.

- **[Rural Health Clinics \(RHCs\)](#)**: Certified to receive special Medicare/Medicaid reimbursement, these clinics must be in rural, underserved areas and staffed by NPs, PAs, or certified nurse midwives.

- **[Critical Access Hospitals \(CAHs\)](#)**: Small, rural hospitals with 25 or fewer beds, focusing on emergency and acute care.

- [**Rural Emergency Hospitals \(REHs\)**](#): A new facility designation that allows rural hospitals to convert to an emergency-only model, reducing inpatient capacity to stay open.

The [Primary Care Association](#) is a great connector for Health Centers within a State.

- [Health Centers](#): HRSA's health centers provide comprehensive primary care, mental health, and dental services in underserved rural or urban areas. One in five rural residents gets their health care from health center. The health centers get grants from HRSA to offset the cost of the uninsured. Many health center grantees have multiple access points and while the grantee may be in an urban area they may have rural locations.

1. [Rural Health Value](#)
 A national initiative funded by FORHP at HRSA that provides technical assistance to support rural healthcare organizations, payers, and communities transition from volume-based to value-based health care and payment models.
 2. [Rural Health Research Gateway](#)
 The Rural Health Research Gateway provides easy and timely access to research conducted by the Rural Health Research Centers, funded by the [Federal Office of Rural Health Policy](#) at HRSA. Gateway efficiently puts new findings and information in the hands of our subscribers, including policymakers, educators, public health employees, hospital staff, and more. The Rural Health Research Gateway also has contact information for all the researchers, who are often subject matter experts in their State and on specific rural health issues.

 For example, the North Carolina Center has a heavy focus on rural hospital financial viability. Researchers from NORC/East Tennessee have published widely on rural hospital bypass. The University of Washington center has a heavy focus on rural workforce issues. The researchers can be a resource to CMS project officers and to States.
 3. [Georgia Health Policy Center](#)
 This entity works supports [community-based grantees](#) from the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy and has subject matter expertise in most of the community health focus areas that are in the transformation proposals. They also have tools for sustaining community health projects.



4. [Rural Health Clinic \(RHC\) TA Center](#)

This entity provides an ongoing series of webinars to support rural health clinics on regulatory, clinical and operational issues. Past webinars are archived and accessible to the public.

5. [National Rural Health Association](#)

This national organization represents hospitals, clinics, community health stakeholders and researchers. They have projects underway for community health workers, rural hospital financial technical assistance through a USDA grant and a rural aging initiative through a partnership with the John A. Hartford Foundation. Programming efforts include:

- a. The [State Rural Health Associations](#) are a resource for connecting with key rural health partners at the State level across the country.
- b. The [Rural Community Health Worker Training Academy](#) work spans training programs along the Southwestern part of the United States and other regions across the country in support of various training curriculums and partnerships for CHWs.
- c. The [Rural Community Health Initiative](#) program supports innovations in rural communities beyond the four walls of a hospital to support innovation and sustainability.
- d. The [National Rural Age-Friendly Initiative](#) is a collaboration between The John A. Hartford Foundation and the National Rural Health Association to develop resources, partnerships, and strategies to build age-friendly care for the one in five older adults living in rural geographies.
- e. The [National Rural Oral Health Initiative](#) is the combined effort of the National Rural Health Association and the CareQuest Institute for Oral Health to improve oral health disparities amongst rural Americans. The efforts of the combined organizations focus on Policy, Communications, Education, and Research; to help spread awareness and prioritize person centered care across the board.
- f. The [Rural Medical Education Group](#) is a special interest group of NRHA committed to advancing the training of physicians for rural practice through network development and policy.
- g. The [Rural Hospital Technical Assistance](#) is a cooperative agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) through which NRHA provides several types of assistance to rural hospitals selected in collaboration with



USDA. TA services are provided under contract with NRHA by selected contractors who specialize in various types of services tailored for rural hospitals.

Supporting Rural Hospitals

Statewide Hospital Programs

FORHP funds statewide programs that support hospital capacity building, run through the [State Offices of Rural Health](#). State RHT staff can connect with [State Flex Program leads](#) to learn more about rural hospital issues and data and get connected in with rural hospitals, as needed.

- The [Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program](#) supports Critical Access Hospitals to improve rural health care quality, hospital financial and operations, emergency medical services, and the health of rural populations. The 45 States with CAHs receive funds (States without CAHs do not receive funds – NJ, MD, CT, RI, DE).
- The [Small Rural Hospital Improvement Program](#) supports small rural hospitals (those 49 beds or fewer as well as Critical Access Hospitals) with funding to improve operations (4 States (those without eligible hospitals) do not receive funds – NJ, CT, RI, DE).

Programs with Direct Support of Hospitals

There are several direct hospital technical assistance programs available for hospitals. Some are National and some are regional. The [FORHP Rural Hospital and Rural Health Clinic Technical Assistance Finder](#) assists hospitals and clinics in determining which programs are available to them. FORHP can work with CMS Project Officers to share more information on which hospitals have been supported and how to best then share that information with the state in a way that protects the privacy of the hospital or clinic.

Nationwide Programs

1. [Rural Emergency Hospital \(REH\) Technical Assistance Center \(TAC\)](#)



- Provides resources and 1:1 TA to ensure rural hospitals and the communities they serve have the information and resources needed to make informed decisions about Rural Emergency Hospital conversion.
- Helps hospitals and communities understand community health needs and how to keep needed health care local.
- TA includes market assessment, REH exploration, and post-conversion REH assistance.
- Rural hospitals nationwide are eligible.

2. Rural Hospital Stabilization Program

- Supports 8-10 rural hospitals per year to enhance and/or expand service lines.
- Helps hospitals retain health care services locally and increase service volume and revenue that will enhance hospitals' financial viability.
- Hospitals receive TA for 15-24 months.
- TA includes financial consultation, market assessment, service line assessment, financial support for new or expanded services, and quality consultation.
- Rural hospitals nationwide are eligible.

3. Targeted Technical Assistance for Rural Hospitals Program

- Supports 4-6 rural hospitals per year to help maintain access to healthcare services in rural areas.
- Helps hospitals and communities understand community health needs and how to keep needed health care local.
- Hospitals receive TA for 24 months.
- TA includes financial consultation, market assessment, quality consultation and virtual education.
- Rural hospitals nationwide are eligible.

4. Rural Healthcare Provider Transition Project

- Supports 4-6 rural hospitals/rural health clinics per year in strengthening their foundation in key elements of value-based care: quality, efficiency, patient experience and patient safety.
- Hospitals/clinics receive TA for 24 months.



- TA includes financial consultation, quality consultation, value-based care guidance and virtual education.
- Rural hospitals and RHCs nationwide are eligible.

Regional Programs

1. [Delta Region Community Health Systems Development \(DRCHSD\) Program | National Rural Health Resource Center](#)

- Supports 10 rural hospitals/rural health clinics per year health care organizations in rural communities in the Mississippi Delta region.
- Hospitals/clinics receive TA for 36 months.
- TA includes financial consultation, quality consultation, financial support for new or expanded services, market assessment, peer learning and virtual education.
- Rural hospitals and RHCs in the Mississippi Delta region are eligible.

2. [Appalachian Region Health Care Support Program](#)

- Supports 6 rural hospitals/rural health clinics per year health care organizations in rural communities in the Appalachian region.
- Hospitals/clinics receive TA for 12-18 months.
- TA includes financial consultation, quality consultation, and financial support for new or expanded services.
- Rural hospitals and RHCs in the Appalachian region are eligible.

Resources for Rural Hospitals

These resources could be useful for informing strategies for hospital sustainability around quality, finance, and operations. These resources are developed from the expertise in supporting CAH improvement efforts through the State Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program work.

1. [National Rural Health Resource Center/Technical Assistance Services Center](#)

This federally funded entity provides technical assistance to the 45 States that are part of the Rural Hospital Flexibility Program and has toolkits and other resources related to Critical Access Hospital Improvement work.



2. [Rural Quality Improvement Technical Assistance Center](#)
Resources for hospitals quality issues related to using data, measurement and improvement. As Transformation Plans focus on improving quality, building on this work may help with showing clinical impact.
3. [Sustaining Rural Labor and Delivery Programs](#)
A FORHP funded resource to ensure hospitals have the most accurate and complete financial analysis when evaluating the sustainability of labor and delivery programs.
4. Critical Access Hospital Research and Data
 - a. [Policy briefs](#) related to issues and successful interventions on hospital quality, finances, operations, EMS and population health – through the Flex Monitoring Team.
 - b. CAHs and [State Flex Program directors](#) use [a data system](#) that helps CAHs use data to develop strategies to improve performance. FORHP can work with CMS Project Officers to identify to share data.
5. [Rural Hospital Financial Distress Index: Relative Risk in 2025](#)
The Financial Distress Index (FDI) uses historical data about hospital financial performance, government reimbursement, organizational characteristics, and market characteristics to predict the probability of rural hospital financial distress within two years. The model assigns every rural hospital to one of four financial risk categories: highest, mid-highest, mid-lowest, or lowest. This infographic shows a U.S. map of the number and percent of rural hospitals within each state at highest relative financial distress risk in 2025. FORHP can work with CMS Project Officers to identify the best way to gain access to this information at an individual hospital level through a process that protects the privacy of the individual hospital.

Enhancing Maternal and Child Health

Programs to States and communities

Why these matter – these are existing programs that support efforts for maternal and child health at the State and community level. State RHT Program leads can connect in

1. [Title V Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant](#)
In all 59 States and jurisdictions, State departments of health determine their priorities and best approaches to improving health care services and systems for women and mothers.
2. [Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Services \(MIECHV\)](#)
Through voluntary home visiting services, uses proven methods to support pregnant women and parents with young children who live in communities that face greater risks and barriers to achieving positive maternal and child health outcomes.
3. [Healthy Start](#)
Through a community-based approach, improves a woman's health before, during, and after pregnancy and aims to ensure their babies are healthy and reach their first birthday.
4. [State Maternal Health Innovation Program](#)
States collaborate with maternal health experts to address health disparities and improve outcomes, with a particular emphasis on preventing severe maternal illness and death.
5. [Integrated Maternal Health Services](#)
Creates and test models that integrate clinical care, behavioral health care, and social services for women who are underserved.
6. [Pediatric Mental Health Care Access Program](#)
Helps pediatric health professionals with consultation, training, resources, and referrals to effectively add behavioral health to routine checkups. Find the [Teleconsultation Phone Line](#) available free of charge for practicing providers in your State.
7. [Screening and Treatment for Maternal Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders](#)
Expands health care providers' ability to screen, assess, treat, and refer pregnant and postpartum women for depression and related disorders.

Funds networks to coordinate the continuum of care, leveraging telehealth and specialty care and improving financial sustainability of maternal health services. A

Increasing Access to Primary care

Health Centers serve 1 in 5 people living in rural communities (9.9M patients in rural areas). In 2024, HRSA provided more than \$1.9 billion in ongoing Health Center Program funding to over 560 health centers in rural areas.

1. [Primary Care Associations](#)

Primary Care Associations are State and regional nonprofit organizations. They work with health centers to best meet the needs of the community health centers serve. They help health centers adapt to changes in the health care environment. They train and help health centers to:

- Increase access to primary care
- Fast-track value-based care delivery
- Foster a health center workforce
- Enhance emergency preparedness and response
- Advance clinical quality and performance

2. [National Technical Assistance Programs](#)

National Technical Assistance Programs (NTAPs) develop, deliver, coordinate, and evaluate technical assistance (TA) for existing and potential Health Center Program grantees and Look-alikes. NTAPs assist health centers in improving fiscal health, engaging in effective workforce development, using health information technology, and providing health care services. This often includes learning collaboratives, webinars, live training, learning modules, online articles, newsletters, toolkits, and fact sheets.

3. [Health Center Controlled Networks](#)

Health Center Controlled Networks (HCCNs) work with PCAs and NTAPs. They provide specialized training and technical assistance to leverage economies of scale, including group purchasing power, shared training, and data analytics to support quality measurement and improvement. HCCNs helped accelerate the adoption of electronic health records among health centers, with more than 98 percent of health centers currently using them across all sites and for all providers. More recent efforts have supported health centers in adopting integrated care models, using health IT for patient engagement, and tracking data to demonstrate the achievement of value-based care.

- 5. [Chronic Disease Director](#) (National Association of Chronic Disease Directors, NACDD)
Member organization of State and Territorial Health Department Chronic Disease Directors and their staff who protect the health of the public through primary and secondary prevention efforts and work upstream on root causes of chronic conditions. In addition, NACDD unites 7,000 chronic disease professionals across the United States working in State, tribal, and territorial health departments, nonprofits, academia, and the private industry to promote health and to reduce the burden of chronic disease.

Advancing Telehealth

Strengthening the Rural Health Workforce

Education and Training Grant Programs

These grants provide support to awardees to establish training and development programs.

1. [Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education Program \(THCGME\)](#)

Focuses on getting physicians to underserved and rural areas by supporting residency programs in community-based primary care settings.

2. [Rural Residency Planning and Development Program](#)

Funds the establishment of new residency programs in various medical fields, aiming to reduce physician shortages in rural areas. Sites interested in this program can connect with [Rural Graduate Medical Education TA Providers](#) to get assistance in the application process. Several States have proposed creating rural residency programs. FORHP and RuralGME can share with CMS project officers a list of rural hospitals that are eligible for Medicare support once they reach accreditation.

3. [Behavioral Health Workforce Development Programs](#)

Improves access to behavioral health and substance use services in rural and



underserved areas by focusing on community-based training, utilizing health support workers, and integrating behavioral health into primary care.

Supporting Behavioral Health

- The [Rural Community Opioids Response Program](#) funds a variety of grant programs each year to prevent, treat and support recovery for opioid use disorders, substance use disorders and behavioral health needs.
- [CDC's Overdose to Action](#) Resources supports jurisdictions in implementing prevention activities and in collecting accurate, comprehensive, and timely data on nonfatal and fatal overdoses and in using those data to enhance programmatic and surveillance efforts. Continuing education credit is available at no cost. This training is for 1) Managers and supervisors in State, tribal, local, and territorial health departments and 2) Senior leaders, managers, and supervisors in public health-serving organizations.

1. U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
