Leadership from the New Jersey Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services and the New Jersey Department of Children and Families will discuss their intensive case management approach called M-WRAP, which combines care management, wraparound services, and recovery supports for opioid dependent pregnant/postpartum women; its work to implement a shared definition for substance exposed infants to guide data and service delivery across systems; surveys with hospitals regarding NAS related policies; an NAS-specific Project ECHO initiative; and future strategic efforts.
