

Medicaid Health Homes: SPA Overview

The Affordable Care Act (Sec. 2703) made the Medicaid health home option available to states in 2011. Since that time, states have made significant strides in using this model to improve care coordination and care management for Medicaid beneficiaries with complex needs. As of December 2015, 20 states and the District of Columbia have a total of 27 approved Medicaid health home models.¹ The health homes have enrolled over 1 million beneficiaries, and 20 states have received health home planning funds from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). Details of the states participating in the Medicaid health home opportunity are listed below. Some states have multiple State Plan Amendments (SPAs) to target different populations or phase-in regional implementation.
